

Umpire Treatment Policy

North Langley has a zero tolerance policy when it comes to the abuse or mistreatment of umpires. What we need to remember is that the majority, if not all of the umpires in our association also play in our association, they are someone's child.

BC Baseball has strict guidelines when it comes to contact between coaches and umpires, including that it is not a right to speak to an umpire it is something that they grant. If there is a call that you want clarification on, you must first ask for permission to approach the umpire. If granted you may then follow the below guidelines. If denied you must accept the fact and return to your coaching position and let the game resume.

Public displays of disagreement, and intimidation or abuse of an official may result in immediate suspension.

The league has provided an avenue for you to raise your concerns about an umpire's conduct during the game. At no time is it acceptable for a coach to approach an umpire and provide them with their views on the game, whether it be before, during or after. Your coaching package includes a form that you can fill out and forward to our UIC.

These are young children themselves trying to learn a new trade, and we should be completely supportive of them.

Non-Confrontational or Verbal Abuse between Coaches, Players and Umpires

Coaches may call time and calmly approach an umpire to

1. Request an interpretation of a rule and/or respectfully communicate to the umpire the rule that the coach believes applies in the situation.
2. Request an explanation of a judgement call for the purpose of understanding what the umpire actually judged to have happened on a play in order to determine if the umpire applied the correct rule.

3. Request that an umpire seek help from his/her partner on a play where an umpire typically may get help (such as a dropped ball, rule interpretation, pulled foot, etc). The umpire is not required to get help and his decision to get help cannot be argued.
4. Make a substitution
5. Raise a safety concern

Coaches, Players and spectators may NOT

1. Argue any judgement call by an umpire
2. Make any comments regarding balls and strikes
3. Request an interpretation of a rule, an explanation of a judgement call, or request any umpire get help by yelling at the umpire from the coach's box or dugout or on the way to speak to the umpire.
4. Argue any call by making comments to a third party
5. Make any gesture that shows public disagreement with an umpire decision

Automatic Suspension

If a member of the coaching staff and/or player is ejected from a game, they may not participate in their next scheduled game.

If a member of the coaching staff and/or player is ejected from the first game of a double header, the coach may not participate in the second game of the double header.

Suspensions:

1. Any player, coach or spectator who is ejected from a game is automatically suspended for one additional game.
2. In the event of a second ejection during the season, the individual will automatically be suspended for three additional games.
3. In the event of a third ejection during the season the individual will automatically be suspended indefinitely pending the review of the NTFCA Board of Directors
